The Philosophy

The artist is a continual student, learning from the experiences of life. This allows the artist to contribute to society, by reflecting a creative awareness back into their community. A community that embraces creativity has a higher potential for a fulfilling, prosperous and compassionate future.

The Graduates

The school offers the support, knowledge, training and conditions to prepare the actor for the commencement of their individual career. Graduates of the school find work in feature films, television shows, commercials, corporate video, role-play work, street theatre, festivals, fringe and professional theatre.

The History

The Actors Workshop commenced training actors in October 1994. In 1999, the school benchmarked accredited training for actors with the qualification: Advanced Diploma of Film, Television and Theatre Acting. It was the first qualification to incorporate equal, dedicated training streams to both the live and camera mediums, for the entire duration of the training strategy.

The Training

Technique

The training strategy is underpinned by a core stream of acting technique. The technique addresses the craft on the emotional, psychological and physical levels necessary for truthful and engaging work. Technique is then applied in application to both the live and camera mediums.

Film and Television

The Film and Television content of the training is delivered via weekly camera classes, throughout the two year period. The successive competencies prepare and skill the actor in the technical nature of the medium, as well as integrating their developing application of technique, with the practicalities and nuances of camera work.

Theatre

The Theatre program is a broad based exploration of the theatrical form, continually examined and experienced on the premise of defining contemporary relevance and application. The theatre program reflects the practical nature of the curriculum through in-house performances at the end of each training semester.

Voice and Movement

Vocal and physical presence is vital to the integrity of the actor's work. This stream of the training includes improvisation, voice production, monologue work, American accent, stage combat and movement skills.

Professional Development

The Professional Development program addresses the transition from student to working actor. Skills included in this stream range from understanding and applying writing structure, critical analysis of film production, workplace health and safety, industry awareness, business budgeting and auditioning techniques.

The Commitment

Contact Hours

Full time students attend up to 28 contact hours of training per week, over two years.

Work Experience

All students are required to undertake work experience opportunities, presented to them by the school. These include short films and role-play work. Students must be prepared to allocate time outside of training hours to complete the work experience program.

Homework Assignments

Most subjects will require homework assignments and scene work from students on a weekly basis as well as end of semester assessments. Students are advised to allow time for non-contact workload.

Rehearsal

Students are required to rehearse for productions outside of school hours, including some evenings and weekends.

The Qualification

Advanced Diploma of Film, Television and Theatre Acting

The Advanced Diploma covers the five streams of training listed above. Full time students attend up to 28 hours of classes a week over four semesters (2 years). The full time program requires 3 days and one evening per week, plus homework, rehearsals and work experience requirements.

Part Time Training for Film and Television

The part time program runs as evening classes, to accommodate students with full time work or family commitments. Classes are from 6:30pm to 10:30pm, two evenings a week, over 4 Terms (12 months). Term dates follow high school term dates, including public holidays. Upon completion, students have achieved industry entry level skills, for working as an actor in film and television. Students receive a Statement of Attainment for each unit of competency completed, and these units may be credited towards further training to complete the full Advanced Diploma.

The School

The school is housed in the historic Foresters Hall. The hall itself includes original stage and lighting grid, costume and props store, front of house bar, and service kitchen. The kitchen is fully equipped and maintained for student use. Adjacent to the hall is the camera studio, and administration offices. The under cover courtyard and garden offer recess areas for students. Notice boards keep students updated on excursions, screenings, openings, auditions, competitions, festivals, industry news, share accommodation, specials and networking opportunities. As well as providing vocational training for actors, the school acts as a resource centre, bringing together young writers, filmmakers and directors. The studios of the school are utilised for rehearsals, readings, auditions, productions and more. The collaboration between students of the school and the emerging production sectors has led to award winning films, independent productions, stage plays and long standing relationships between networking artists.

The Location

Situated in Trinity Lane, Woolloongabba, the school is very central and accessible. Within a 15 minute walk from Trinity Lane you will find South Bank Parklands, Queensland Convention Centre, Queensland Performing Arts Centre, State Library, Mater Hospital, Queensland Museum, Queensland Art Gallery, Gallery of Modern Art, Griffith University, the Gabba stadium, multi cultural dining, bars, pubs, clubs and cafes.

Trinity lane is adjacent to Stanley Street and is easily accessed from both the north and south bound freeways as well as by traffic coming south bound over the Story Bridge. Limited, short term street parking is available in Trinity lane and adjacent streets. The Mater Hill and Woolloongabba bus stations are within 5 minutes walk from the school and the Vulture Street and Park Road train stations are within 10 minutes walking distance. River Cat Ferries stop at South Bank (10 minutes walk from the school) and the Goodwill Bridge across the Brisbane River allows student access to the Botanical Gardens and the city CBD within a 15 minute stroll.

The Principal

Lyn Kidd has been teaching Acting Technique and Voice Production for over 35 years, leading to her developing the Advanced Diploma of Film, Television and Theatre Acting, listed on the Australian Qualifications Framework in December 1999.

Lyn first trained as an A.M.E.B. Speech and Drama teacher and then trained in the Stella Adler Technique under the tutelage of Jone Winchester and Brian Syron. Lyn was twice the recipient of the prestigious Peter Summerton Foundation Scholarship, studying Acting, Direction, Script Analysis and Voice Production with internationally recognised Master Teachers, Rowena Balos and Yevgeny Lansky. Lyn is also the co-author of *The Jungle of Sounds: a Journey through the Magic of Language*, published by Antipodean Educational Enterprises.

Lyn has been an international guest teacher to both the Philippines and the Solomon Islands and also works extensively with the Queensland community sector. In 2003 Lyn was presented with a shield for Excellence in Education by the Commissioner of Queensland Emergency Services, in recognition of the contribution she has made to the assessment strategies of community training organisations.

Since opening her school, Lyn has consistently invested time, energy and resources in supporting the emerging film makers of Queensland, including TAFE, Tertiary and Independent short films, documentaries and feature films. This has led to a succession of awards won by projects made in association with her school.

In 2004, Lyn was presented with the Kinetone Award at the 18th Annual Warner Roadshow Studios Queensland New Film Makers Award. The Minister for Education and the Arts congratulated Lyn on being the first woman and the first educator to receive the Kinetone. This prestigious award is given each year to an individual in recognition of their contribution to the Queensland Film and Television industry.

At the 2004 Queensland Training Awards, Lyn was honoured with the award for Small Training Provider of the Year.

In 2010 Lyn was awarded the Media Mates Award for her contribution to Southside TAFE Screen and Media School.

The Difference

Quality Assured Training

As a registered training organisation, the school delivers the highest standard of accredited training.

Centre Link Support

Students enrolling in full time training offered by the school are eligible for Centre Link support through Abstudy, Austudy or Newstart.

Industry Recognition

The school enjoys a high reputation throughout industry and the majority of our students find the school through industry referrals.

Enrolment Cap

The school recognises the limited employment available for actors and maintains a limited number of enrolments each year to ensure a high student to teacher ratio.

Work Experience and Training Alliances

Over the years the school has developed a unique and extensive work experience program, involving alliances with tertiary, community and training organisations. As well, the school supports a vast amount of projects in the emerging film industry. This gives students opportunity to apply what they learn, as they learn and to accrue credits for their resume and actual production footage for show reels.

Structured Training Strategy

Every hour of every class is structured within the training and assessment strategies of the school. Competencies are layered in prerequisite and concurrent stages, so the further the student progresses in the course the higher the complexity and deeper the foundations of their training.

Professionalism

A large focus of the philosophy of training involves developing a realistic appreciation of the actors craft and industry. The school holds a high reputation for down to earth, creative and hard working graduates.

Quantity

Students training in the Advanced Diploma undertake over 2000 hours of training. This represents up to three times the amount of training offered by other private colleges.

Dual Mediumship

No other acting school offers the ratio of dedicated practical experience of both the camera and live mediums, throughout the entire duration of the course. This means our graduates have the competitive edge of working in both mediums with ease.
